	<p>Atonement by Ian McEwan</p> <p>After 13-year-old Briony Tallis witnesses a flirtation between her sister Cecilia and Robbie, the housekeeper's son, she unwittingly triggers a tragic chain of events. 	<p>Pride and Prejudice by Jane Austen</p> <p>'It is a truth universally acknowledge, that a single man in possession of a good fortune must be in want of a wife.' Beginning with one of the most famous lines in literature, Pride and Prejudice is probably the easiest of Austen's novels to read. Elizabeth Bennett is a lively and engaging heroine, and this classic romance is still incredibly popular.</p>	<p>Classics</p>
	<p>The Woman in White by Wilkie Collins</p> <p>Young art teacher, Walter Hartright, falls in love with his student, the pretty Laura Fairlie, but he is struck by Laura's resemblance to the mysterious 'woman in white'. This is an atmospheric Victorian mystery sometimes considered to be the forerunner of traditional detective novels.</p>	<p>Classics</p>

	<p>To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee</p> <p>A vivid child's-eye view of segregation in the American South. It introduces Atticus Finch, a quiet hero fighting for justice against the racist prejudices of small-town America.</p>	<p>Classics</p>

	<p>The Great Gatsby by F. Scott Fitzgerald</p> <p>A classic of American literature. This tells the story of Jay Gatsby, living a decadent, glittering lifestyle in 1920s New York.</p>	<p>Classics</p>
	<p>Dracula by Bram Stoker</p> <p>A young solicitor, Jonathan Harker, is invited on a business visit to Count Dracula's castle in Transylvania. After his disturbing discoveries there, Harker joins the mission to understand and hence destroy vampires. 	<p>Frankenstein by Mary Shelley</p> <p>When the scientist Victor Frankenstein stitches together a hideous creature from stolen human body parts, he is so revolted by his creation that he rejects it entirely. The grotesque monster he has created seeks his revenge. This classic Gothic horror story was written when Mary Shelley was only nineteen.</p>	<p>Horror</p>
	<p>Code Name Verity by Elizabeth Wein</p> <p>A spy plane flown by a female pilot and carrying her best friend, a British spy, crashes in Nazi-occupied France. 	<p>Salt to the Sea by Ruta Sepetys</p> <p>Four young refugees with different wartime experiences flee the advance of the Russians troops, desperately trying to reach the ship that promises safety and freedom. 	<p>The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas by John Boyne</p> <p>Nine-year-old Bruno does not understand why his Nazi father has been sent with his family to live in a desolate and lonely place. This epic fantasy trilogy is a sequel to The Hobbit, and tells the story of Frodo, a young hobbit entrusted with the task of destroying the One Ring in the Crack of Doom. In his perilous journey across Middle Earth, Frodo and his companions encounter elves, dwarves, wizards and many more fantastical and terrifying creatures.

When Clary Fray discovers the dark side of New York City, she gets drawn into the world of Shadowhunters, warriors dedicated to ridding the world of demons. Recommended for fans of Harry Potter, Twilight and the Hunger Games.

A moving and superbly illustrated graphic novel describing the journey of Ebo and Kwame, refugees from North Africa, to Europe in search of their sister.

A fascinating true account of a young Japanese boy’s experience of autism. This book challenges the view that autism is characterised by a lack of empathy. It gives a heartbreaking yet hopeful picture of a boy who struggles to express the overwhelming nature of his feelings.



Testament of Youth by Vera Brittain

Testament of Youth is one of the most famous autobiographies of the First World War. In 1914, Vera Brittain was twenty and preparing to study at Oxford. Instead, she became a VAD, nursing soldiers in London, Malta and the Western Front. Her story of the loss of a generation of young men is profoundly moving.
