Opportunities in Sixth Form at Bryn Celynnog

The Sixth Form is open to any student who will benefit from the education and opportunities we offer. All students will be offered guidance on the range of options open to them at enrolment.

We work closely with Y Pant to form a Sixth Form consortium in order to offer a broad range of opportunities and experiences. This will give you more choice to follow a curriculum which suits your goals.

The Sixth Form seeks to provide you with:

- The opportunity to obtain academic and vocational qualifications which are required for higher and further education and employment.
- The opportunity to mature and develop in an environment which is familiar.
- The opportunity to discuss academic, personal and social problems with an experienced pastoral team.
- The opportunity to take responsibility and acquire leadership skills.
- The opportunity to participate in social activities, charity work and community activities both in and out of school.
- Sixth Form teaching staff who are experienced, committed, caring, of high quality and place great emphasis on encouraging you to fulfil your potential.

At Bryn Celynnog we are very proud of the nurture that we provide each and every student. This care and guidance is shown during every moment of your sixth form experience, this includes:

- Guidance to choose options that will allow you to fulfil dreams and aspirations
- Support through your subject teachers to ensure that your academic potential is achieved
- Individualised advice during the UCAS application process allowing you to make the most informed choices.
- Personal statement clinics to ensure that you have the greatest chance of securing your place at the University of your choice.
- Access to Seren Hub. If you have the aspiration and aptitude to attend a prestigious University,
 Bryn Celynnog has a strong and well established relationship with Seren Hub. You will have
 access to a programme of enrichment with other like minded students that will greatly support
 your application.
- Care and support even after you receive your results. A dedicated team of staff will be supporting you to secure the correct placement if your plans change.



Expectations of students

The Sixth Form is a partnership between you and your teachers that is not possible lower down the school. Your status when you join the Sixth Form will bring you certain privileges. You will have far greater freedom than you have had before, and far more time away from formal tuition. We recognise your status by providing you with a well resourced private study area. This new freedom, however, demands greater responsibility.

For example, you must seek to find the correct balance between work, socialising and studying during your limited non tutor-contact time.

In order to be successful, you will need self-discipline and be able to set yourself targets. You will be encouraged to:

- take responsibility for yourself
- work with some degree of independence
- develop ideas and attitudes.

Returning to the sixth form also brings with it certain responsibilities. As a member of the Sixth Form you are perceived as a role model for the rest of the school.

Your choices may mean that you will have to travel between Bryn Celynnog and Y Pant in which case transport will be provided. You will be expected to meet the departure times punctually and respect the school you are visiting.

GRADING AND ASSESSMENT

Both A Level and AS level will be graded at A*, A, B, C, D, E pass grades and U (unclassified) denoting a fail.

BTEC qualifications are graded Distinction*, Distinction, Merit and Pass.

Monthly attendance checks will be made and parents informed if your attendance in lessons falls below 90%. If your attendance falls below this level you will be expected to pay your examination entry fees.

ASSESSMENT AND EXAMINATION

You will be assessed on a regular basis and in a manner which is directly relevant to the type of course you are studying. All aspects of your academic performance will be monitored in a nurturing environment.

Transport

A minibus transports sixth form students several times a day between Bryn Celynnog and Y Pant. The transport is free of charge.

Students living in the Bryn Celynnog catchment area may qualify for free home school transport. Log on to www.rctcbc.gov.uk and navigate to home school transport.



CHOOSING YOUR COURSE

Subjects will be placed in five option columns.

You will have the opportunity to choose up to 5 AS levels from different option columns. You should be sensible in the choice of course you make in the Sixth Form. It is important to choose a course best suited to your aptitude, competence and future aspirations. If you know your career intentions, or at least have some idea, you should base your course choices on these. If not, you should try to choose courses that keep your options open. Whatever happens, you should choose courses that you will enjoy.

YOU HAVE A DEFINITE CAREER IN MIND

If after full consultation with your parents, careers officer and subject teachers, you have a definite career in mind, you should know the entry requirements in terms of examination subjects which need to be passed and/or the further or higher education or job training which is involved. You should therefore choose the "A" level or vocational course, or a combination of those which will fit these requirements. You will need to discuss with the Sixth Form team or subject teachers whether your ambition is realistic in terms of your respective strengths and weaknesses.

YOU HAVE A GENERAL IDEA ABOUT YOUR FUTURE CAREER

You may have only tentatively chosen a career field, but are not yet certain of the specific career you would like to aim for e.g. You may be inclined towards a career in social services, engineering or business. If this is the case you must look for all the advice and help you can get before choosing your course. You will be able to pin-point the subjects needed to realise your goal.

YOU HAVE NOT YET MADE UP YOUR MIND ABOUT A FUTURE CAREER

If you genuinely have no idea what career you would like to follow the best course of action would be to consider the subjects you enjoy doing and are good at. If you have a broad base of GCSEs, and for example, enjoy an arts subject such as English and have performed quite well in it at GCSE, then this would be a wise choice of an "A" Level.

HOW DO YOU FINALLY MAKE YOUR CHOICE?

This booklet is designed to help you make your choices. The contents are arranged alphabetically to make your task of searching through the information easy. It does not reflect in any way the importance we attach to one particular course over another, all are equally valued. After reading the information you will need to decide whether "A" levels, vocational courses or a combination of both is best suited to your particular aptitude and ability. Subject: Advanced Skills Baccalaureate Wales (Compulsory)

Exam Board: WJEC

Location: Bryn Celynnog

What does the course involve?

The central focus of the Advanced Skills Baccalaureate Wales at Key Stage 5 is to provide a vehicle for 16-18 year olds to prepare for their future by developing skills, attributes and behaviours valued by universities and potential employers. The emphasis on the Advanced Skills Baccalaureate is on applied learning i.e. acquiring and applying a range of transferable skills.

To achieve this A Level students must complete three mandatory projects which provide a vehicle for students to develop, practice and demonstrate **Integral Skills** through a range of contexts that are relevant and current and that encourage students to participate in critical and civil engagement and to consider their well-being and the well-being of others.

The Advanced Skills Wales Baccalaureate consists of three challenges. Each challenge is internally assessed and externally moderated. The challenges have the following weightings:


Individual Project - 50% Global Community Project - 25% Future Destination Project - 25%

What are the benefits of achieving the Advanced Skills Baccalaureate Wales Qualification?

The Advanced Skills Baccalaureate provides students with unique opportunities and experiences which will differentiate their university applications from those without such in-depth evidence of real life skills application.

The level and nature of work required is viewed by employers and universities alike as a significant achievement and a clear indication of potential for success in Higher Education and beyond.

We have seen a number of students for whom the achievement of this qualification has been a deciding factor in gaining a place at university.

Subject: Art and Design Level: AS and A LEVEL

Exam Board: WJEC

Location: Bryn Celynnog

Course Details

The 'A' Level course is intended for students who wish to pursue, extend and develop their studies of Art & Design to a greater depth than that is required for GCSE. Art, Craft and Design is distinguishable from other options in as much as students are enabled to demonstrate personal interests and abilities across a particularly broad course of study. Students are expected to take risks in their work through exploring materials, techniques and processes with a strong emphasis on drawing. Students are also required to study in depth, the work of contemporary and historical practitioners to inform their own extended written work.

Requirements/skills for entry onto the course

Due to the new specification students need to show strong evidence of drawing and a theory study, all students should have at least a grade "B" in GCSE Art and Design and GCSE in English. Students who have a "C" grade will be accepted following consultation with staff and on the condition that the first term is a probationary period and progress will be carefully monitored. The course is demanding and requires a high level of commitment, motivation and self-discipline particularly when researching Art Galleries, libraries and completing workbooks and working independently in the 6th form studio and out of school.

Career Opportunities

Students may progress on to a one year Foundation course at college or go straight onto their degree studies. Interviews for the Foundation course take place after Christmas in Year 13. Following the foundation year, students can then choose to study at degree level, there are many exciting and rewarding fields in Art & Design, e.g. Fine Art, 3D Design, Fashion Design, Textile/Interior Design, Graphics, Illustration, Ceramics, Metalwork or glass forming, Film Animation, Game Design etc. The A Level course in Art and Design is stimulating and rewarding in its own right, whether or not the student is specifically aiming at a career in this field. It is a recognised qualification for entry into Higher Education.

Subject: Biology

Level: AS and A LEVEL

Exam Board: WJEC

Location: Bryn Celynnog

Course Details

The specification presents essential principles in contexts that students will find interesting. Fundamental Biology is studied through aspects of disease causing organisms and their effects. This course builds upon concepts and skills that have been developed in the GCSE Science course. It presents Biology as exciting, relevant and challenging. The course emphasises the way in which scientists work and the contributions of science to modern society.

Subject: Business Studies Level: AS and A LEVEL

Exam Board: WJEC

Location: Bryn Celynnog

Course Details

This course encourages students to take a problem-solving approach to Business Studies in order to help them understand the nature and operation of business and industry and to develop their ability to recognise, define, analyse and evaluate problems. Whenever appropriate, ICT resources are used e.g. construction of break-even charts and internet based researches.

This course is a demanding but highly interesting one and would be an excellent preparation for those anticipating a business related degree course or perhaps a career in commerce and industry.

Subject: Chemistry Level: AS and A LEVEL

Exam Board: WJEC

Location: Bryn Celynnog

Course Details

The chemistry course is intended for students who wish to pursue their studies of chemistry to a greater depth and understanding than that required for GCSE. The emphasis of this course is on developing understanding and applying knowledge to explain modern applications of chemistry.

The specification is divided into chemical topics, each containing different key concepts of chemistry. Students must be prepared to apply the knowledge, understanding and skills specified in a range of theoretical, practical, industrial and environmental context. Practical work is an intrinsic part of this specification. It is vitally important in developing a conceptual understanding of many topics and it enhances the experience and enjoyment of chemistry. The practical skills developed are also fundamentally important to learners going on to further study in chemistry and related subjects, and are transferable to many careers.

Subject: Computer Science Level: AS and A LEVEL

Exam Board: WJEC

Course Details

Computers are widely used in all aspects of business, industry, government, education, leisure and the home. In this increasingly technological age, a study of computer science, and particularly how computers are used in the solution of a variety of problems, is not only valuable to the learners but also essential to the future well-being of the country. CS integrates well with subjects across the curriculum. It demands both logical discipline and imaginative creativity in the selection and design of algorithms and the writing, testing and debugging of programs; it encourages an awareness of the management and organisation of computer systems; it extends the learners' horizons beyond the school or college environment in the appreciation of the effects of computer science on society and individuals.

Brief outline of the course and method of assessment

The AS qualification requires completion of Unit 1 and Unit 2. To meet the requirements of the A level qualification, students will be required to complete all five units. The weightings below are expressed in terms of the full A level qualification.

Entry Requirements

There are no prior learning requirements. GCSEs in Mathematics, English, Science and Information Communication Technology will provide a good basis for progression to this qualification. Prior knowledge, understanding and skills through the study of Computer Science at GCSE would be beneficial but not essential.

Careers Opportunities

The course designed to be of interest to a wide range of students including those intending to progress to university to study Computer Science, Mathematics, Medicine, Engineering, Science, Business and Digital Art. We are living in the Digital Age, computer programmes have all but infiltrated every aspect of our lives. Computer scientists theorise, design, develop and apply the software and hardware for the programmes we use every day. Programming has become an essential skill, problems in science, engineering, health care, and so many other areas can be solved by computers. With every industry using computers, naturally the need for computer scientists is exceptionally high, resulting in highly rated employment prospects post study.

Subject: Criminology Level: Level 3 Diploma

Exam Board: WJEC

Location: Bryn Celynnog

Course Details

An understanding of criminology is relevant to many job roles within the criminal justice sector, social and probation work and sociology and psychology. WJEC Level 3 Applied Diploma in Criminology is a qualification with elements of psychology, law and sociology that complements studies in humanities. This is an Applied General qualification. This means it is designed primarily to support students progressing to university. It has been designed to offer exciting and interesting experiences through applied learning, i.e. through the acquisition of knowledge and understanding in purposeful contexts linked to the criminal justice system.

Brief outline of the course and method of assessment

All units carry equal weighting

| Unit 1 Controlled Assessment | Changing Awareness of Crime Students will assess how the public, based on media portrayal, measurement by the state and social values, perceives crime. Study of these areas will culminate in the creation of a campaign to raise awareness, or change the perception of a specific criminal offence. |

Entry Requirements

Students should have achieved at least 5 GCSEs at grade C and above including English and mathematics.

Careers Opportunities

On successful completion of this course, students could apply to and be offered places at university on courses related to Criminology, Sociology, Law or Psychology. Alternatively, the course will enhance an application to work in the areas of the criminal justice sector, social and probation work.

Subject: DT - Product Design Level: AS and A LEVEL

Location: Bryn Celynnog

Course Details

Students will, at all times, be encouraged to use their own initiative both in designing and making. The course is designed so that personal interests and qualities can be emphasised, so that their individual qualities can shine through.

The subject is useful to demonstrate to universities how students are able to work through a problem using logical systems to overcome problems. A great number of skills, useful in many courses, are required e.g. research, analysis, evaluation. Anyone wishing to pursue careers related to design or engineering, Architecture, graphics or manufacturing will find the course stimulating and have great benefit.

Course Details

A Level English Literature is interesting, demanding and extremely rewarding. The course encourages the development of an appreciation and enjoyment of literature and literary studies. Students will embark on a thought provoking exploration of a wide range of texts; those set by their teacher and others that they have selected independently. Students will be required to engage with these texts critically and creatively, developing their responses to them while applying their knowledge of literary analysis and evaluation.

Entry Requirements

The Geography A and AS level course is offered to students who have achieved a minimum GCSE grade B in the subject. 

Students require a grade B or above at GCSE History in order to study the subject at AS/A2 level. They also require a high level of commitment, motivation and self-discipline in order to succeed. In particular, the A2 modules require extensive independent research skills along with the ability to answer unseen open-ended essay questions in a highly sophisticated manner.

Careers Opportunities

Studying History at AS/ A2 level enables students to develop a highly critical and evaluative approach to analysing concepts such as change and continuity within a political, social and economic framework. Students by necessity become highly adept at constructing arguments both in the spoken and written form. As such, it enables students to develop a wide range of transferable skills; hence the popularity of History as a qualification for all forms of employment. The subject is fascinating in its own right and, at AS/ A2 level, encompasses the study of a wide range of areas and periods that shaped the very formation of the modern world in which we live today.

The AS course involves 2 examinations, Pure Mathematics (2 hours 30 minutes) and Applied Mathematics (1 hour 45 minutes). The A Level course involves a further 2 examinations in Pure Mathematics and Applied Mathematics (i.e. a full A Level consists of 4 examinations).

Assessment is 100% examination. The AS course involves 3 examinations. The A level course involves a further 2 examinations.

In Year 12 students follow the full A Level Mathematics course i.e. Units 1, 2, 3 and 4 (as described on the previous page.).

In Year 13 students follow the Further Mathematics units 1, 2, 3 and 4 (as shown below) plus one extra unit (either unit 5 or Unit 6).

Students will be accepted following a consultation with staff. The first term is a probationary period and students' progress will be closely monitored. The course is demanding and requires a high-level of self-discipline, motivation and commitment. Students will need to manage workloads effectively, particularly when working independently for research purposed. It is essential that they have access to a camera and are able to fund printing costs.

Students may progress to a one year Foundation Course on the evidence of a sound portfolio of work at interview. Interviews take place at the start of Year 13. 
Students are expected to have achieved an A or A* grade in GCSE Welsh.
