Maths at Cardiff University

During the summer holidays, I undertook a three-week research placement in the Mathematics Department at Cardiff University. I developed my own mathematical model to describe defects in liquid crystal films and wrote an extensive thesis on the topic using LaTeX. I applied mathematics from A-level lessons, such as vectors and calculus, while also learning new abstract concepts like the 'curl' and 'grad' functions in linear algebra, and how they apply to real-world situations.

This was a once-in-a-lifetime experience: it clarified the career path I want to pursue, boosted my confidence in using mathematics, and exposed me to mathematical fields beyond the A-level syllabus. I would highly recommend a Nuffield research project to anyone. Not only was it enjoyable, but it's proving beneficial now as I apply to university, giving me extra-curricular material to discuss in my personal statement.



Year 13 CPS Workshop

Last month, Year 13 students had the fantastic opportunity to participate in a Law Workshop led by a CPS Prosecutor, focusing on evaluating the effectiveness of the Crown Prosecution Service.

This is a key area of the criminal specification for their course, and there was no better way to learn about the inner workings of the CPS than from a seasoned expert. We were fortunate to have the Chief Crown Prosecutor join the class, and she immediately engaged the students by dividing them into groups.

Each group was assigned a specific research topic, which they later presented to the class for discussion.

Together, the groups created a timeline of the CPS, highlighting its advantages and disadvantages. This collaborative exercise provided valuable material for the essays the students had been working on.

The workshop was highly appreciated, and the students are now looking forward to their upcoming trip to Cardiff Crown Courts next month to continue their exploration of the criminal justice system.

Uniformed Protective Services at 6th Form

This month, Year 12 and Year 13 students had the exciting opportunity to visit the University of South Wales for a teambuilding workshop connected to the public service industry. The workshop forms part of their non-examination assessment for the Uniformed Protective Services Course.

Students were fortunate to participate in an innovative new workshop system called 'Hydra'. In this system, they were grouped into teams and placed in technology-enhanced suites, where they awaited an online crime scenario involving the police. As video links were sent, students had to work together to decide how to respond to the situation.



The interactive whiteboard tables were a big hit, allowing students to visually brainstorm possible strategies that the police could implement. The day was a great success, with all students fully engaged and thoroughly enjoying the immersive 'Hydra' experience.



RRS James Cook

On Friday, 18th October, 18 sixth form students and their teachers had a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to tour the RRS James Cook, a royal research ship. They learned about various science, technical, and ship-based careers, as well as the career pathways associated with scientific missions. We were amazed by the sheer size of the ship and the array of scientific equipment on board.

During the tour, we met several crew members and scientists who shared insights into their jobs and the career paths that led them there. Their passion and enthusiasm for their work were infectious, leaving us inspired to imagine careers that involve traveling the world while conducting important scientific research.

Oceanography, an exciting branch of environmental science, tackles some of the major planetary

challenges of our time, such as climate change. The range of careers within oceanographic research is much broader than one might expect. Oceanographers studying remote and extreme ocean environments may spend weeks at sea collecting data. Mariners, engineers, and technicians are essential to the broader team that makes these scientific missions possible. Career pathways range from cadet training to apprenticeships in technology and engineering.

We had an incredible visit and even had the chance to see *Doctor Who* being filmed in Cardiff Bay!

A big thank you to the Natural Environment Research Council (NERC), in partnership with the National Oceanography Centre (NOC) and Techniquest Cardiff, for organizing the event.



Pupil Accounts

Pupils have been given access to their own account, which they will be able to log into via a computer/mobile phone app or by speaking with their Form Tutor.

Once a pupil has logged into their account they will be able to see their behaviour points and have access to the Reward Store, where they can purchase rewards online with the positive points they have collected.

Rewards Store

Rewards are an acknowledgement of pupils' hard work and effort both in the classroom and around the school. There is a constant expectation that all pupils will be praised and rewarded. Pupils will be notified when they receive positive points by their classroom teacher and can monitor their score via the ClassCharts website or App. Positive points also link directly to the Rewards Store in ClassCharts. Pupils can purchase their chosen item from the app and collect it in school. The current list of available items is listed in the Rewards Store.
